

- Focused employees committed to safety


By the numbers:

- 5.8 million hours worked with four OSHA recordables
- All-time low recordable incident rate of 0.14
- Zero lost-time injuries

In 2016:


- Relentless attention to safety

Consistently High Reliability

2015 highlights:

- Moved 185 million barrels 508,000 barrels a day
- Reliability: 99.5 percent
- Loaded 236 tankers

Ongoing system renewal:

- Electrification and automation at Pump Station 1
- 10,600-pound, 17-foot "smart pig" run
- Industrial wastewater and ballast water treatment system repairs
- Adding heat to manage declining throughput
- Completed testing of all 176 mainline valves, replacing one
- Two major shutdowns
- Berth overhauled

Environmental Stewardship

Extreme Alaska:

- Successfully managed major flooding conditions of the "Sag" River
- Helped protect TAPS from some of Alaska's worst wildfires on record

Emergency preparedness:


- Staged 180 readiness and response drills along the pipeline and in Prince William Sound
- Trained 1,800 people from 444 vessels in spill response tactics
- Assisted agencies with two third-party tanker rollover spills on the Dalton Highway

- In Fairbanks, Alyeska's Track and Field Day drew 400 children


Throughout Alaska, employees support communities where they live and work with volunteerism, leadership and financial support.

- Lower throughput
- Cold weather operations
- Water and wax issues
- Aging infrastructure

Our goal is to build on our successes, learn from our experiences and sustain TAPS' high performance for years to come.

Implementing solutions:

- Recirculation at Pump Stations 3, 4, 7 and 9
- Crude oil heater added at Remote Gate Valve 65
- Crude oil heater at Pump Station 8, 2016-17
- Flow assurance testing program
- Contingency methanol injection
- Advancing pigging technology

Wax Management

 Flow loop wax testing to characterize wax thickness and composition

 Canty devices on TAPS to begin collecting wax behavioral data

- Sampling and testing of recovered pigged wax from TAPS
- Use results of wax testing to tune wax model
- Model pipeline wax deposition profile
- Adjust pigging program to manage wax deposits
