


Alaska—Past Long Term Trends No Longer A Road Map To The Future (basically 27 years of growth)



Employment Growth Gone In 2016 In AK




This Is How Things Are Shaping Up In AK In 2016


Alaska's Total Wage and Salary Employment

Over-the-year change






Alaska's Personal Income Numbers Still Looking Good--First 2 Quarters of 2016 Still Slightly Positive




Alaska Foreclosures Statewide, 1st Qrt 1980 - 2nd Qrt 2016



Unemployment Rates, Alaska and U.S. January 2005 to September 2016











Millions of gallons of beer, wine and liquor consumption in AK




Alaska's Timber Industy Employment--Not Much Change






Little Change For Mining Employment In Alaska











An Economic Comeback Kid --Toying with Gold Rush Peak




A History of Oil Industry Employment in Alaska



Oil Industry Losses Began Last Year




Previous Oil And Gas Employment Losses In AK




Alaska's High Earners Under Thirty




AK's Population Grew Lots During The Great Recession But Now Slowing (2015 population was 737,625)




AK's Migration Story


